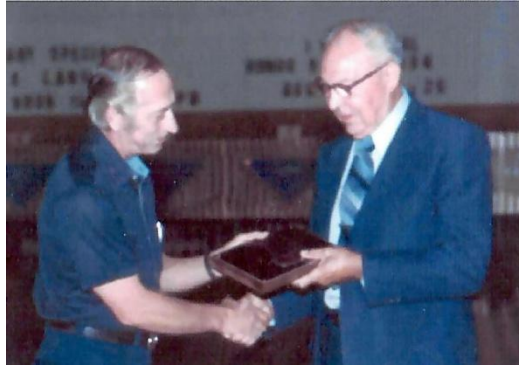


MARSHALL UPJOHN

Men's Veteran Skill – 1979

Marshall moved to Oklahoma City as a child with his Mother and seven brothers and sisters. He was a sanctioned bowler for 45 years, recording high game of 289 and 689 high series. His five highest averages are: 189, 190, 193, 192 and 189. He is described as quiet, easy going and well liked person that is a dedicated student of the game of bowling. Some of Marshall's accomplishments are:

- 1933 Southwest Tournament – 1st Place Team Event
- 1934 Oklahoma State Tournament – 1st Singles Event
- 1934 OKC Times Singles Classic – 1st Place Singles
- 1934-35 Member of the Mattison-Wallack Team – State Traveling Scratch League
- 1935 Became City League Secretary until he joined the Army in WWII
- 1937 Southwest Tournament – 1st Place Doubles Event
- 1938 Tri-State Doubles Tournament – 1st Place Doubles Event

After WWII, Marshall entered college and after graduation joined the accounting department at Tinker Air Force Base. He never entered Class A competition after the war, but continued to bowl in the Southside Church league and the Tinker closed leagues and tournaments. He has some 42 trophies in his trophy case – some team awards – some tournament awards and many individual awards. For his years of dedication and bowling skill, the Oklahoma City Bowling Council inducts Marshall Upjohn into its Hall of Fame.
